Audiobooks

Audiobooks are professionally recorded performances of written texts. By themselves or in coordination with e-books, they are excellent tools for improving:

- Vocabulary
- Collocations
- Pronunciation & Phrasing
- Reading Comprehension
- Enjoyment of Literature

Finding audiobooks is easy and doesn't have to cost a lot of money! Here are some places you can find cheap/free audiobooks:

While your public library will not let you keep permanent copies of an audiobook, they tend to have the widest selection for the lowest price (FREE)! Each public library has a slightly different lending program, but they typically work like this:

1. **Sign-up for a free library card and library account.** Do this in person at your nearest library branch. Bring a photo ID and a piece of mail or bill that shows your address.
2. **Find CD versions of audiobooks in person at your library branch.**
3. **Find digital versions of audiobooks online at your library's website.**
 - a. **Download the free software** onto your computer or the free app onto your mobile device. The type of software will vary by library, but most libraries support PCs, Macs, and mobile devices.
 - b. **Browse the library's catalog** for books that interest you. If you're not sure where to start, ask a librarian for suggestions. Your professors here at MC might also be able to recommend books that will be interesting and appropriate for your reading level.
 - c. **Download the books you want.** Most libraries place a limit on how many you can borrow at one time (usually between 6-10 titles).
 - d. **There's no need to "return" digital audiobooks.** The files will disappear when the lending period is over.
